NARRATIVE: Note player choice of nightmare or fairytale will create a variable that affects the underlined adjectives/nouns in the next section with increased "madness" or "sugar-coated" variables. The Witch's voice trying to stay as neutral as Edith Finch.

Nightmare Storybook Text NOTE: This flowchart intends for each found journal page to have writing on both sides of the page, when held up to the light, the player can read all of the text and know the REAL story. Include some player choice questions in each block of text i.e. Did you do it?


Fairytale Storybook Text NOTE: This text will all be written on the front of the journal page with large "gaps" in the text for the real story that is written on the back, only legible if the page is picked up and held up to the light. If this mechanic doesn't work, alternatives could be two different journal pages? Journal pages that require decoding?



Witch/Greta/Gretel's Grandmother's snarky comments when she can't hold back


The Remains of the past are the foundation of the future. Establish the story, why you are here: You are Gretel, 17, years old, pregnant, dislocated from your family, starving, trying to remember what happened in your childhood so that you know what to tell your baby, you are looking for what remains of your childhood, you have snippets of a sugar-coated fairy tale story about your family, but it's incomplete, and you've been having nightmares lately, about your family, but they don't make sense either. You've come back to the forest where your childhood home is. You're scared. You want to be a good mother and care for your baby, but you don't know what to do.

You arrive at the garden gate in front of your childhood home, you lived in this house until you were 11, you haven't been back in six years, you had to come back.... but as you reach for the latch... a flash of memory makes you shudder and freeze. Do you want to try to remember what happened without getting any closer to the house? Or, do you open the gate and proceed?



Great, you've gotta be brave to find out your family story

Seriously, Gretel we haven't even started the scary part! You're not gonna find the answers standing here. Get your courage together or leave and wonder what happened to your family.




You step through the gate, a cool breeze/cy wind sweeps over you. You look up to the sky and see that the sun is shining/dark clouds cover the sun. You step onto the porch and the old wood creaks ominously/familiarly. Your stomach gurgles with hunger. Maybe there will be a scrap of food inside the old house? Are you ready to lift the latch and enter your childhood home?




Great, you've gotta be brave to find out the story

Gretel! If you're not even brave enough to enter the house, this isn't gonna work.



You step through the door and the first thing that you notice is the smell of old wood/death. You step over to a simple wooden SHELF and find a page of what looks like a journal on top. The ink is blood red/black and the lettering is shaky/fluid and beautiful. There are strange gaps in the text. The page makes you nervous/excited to see what is written. Do you pick it up, or stand over it try to read it on the shelf?



Before you begin reading you see a note in the corner of the page. "Hold me up to the light if you want know the truth."

Before you make your decision, I have to say... I don't know whose idea of a fairytale this is, even the sugar-coated version is pretty grim. Yes, that pun was intended. The Grimm brother's wrote this story about a decade long famine in 1315 that killed 25% of the population of Europe and caused people to do terrible things, so it's going to be dark, and even in the cleaned-up fairy tale version, there's going to be at least one murder, so get ready for gross.



Your beloved mother is dead. Vision of your mother: Plague starvation imagery, paint a terrible picture of your neighbors dying, going into the village with your mother and seeing people robbing graves, eating babies, etc. Your mother knows that you are starving she encourages you to do whatever you have to do to survive

Something scurries across your feet. You look down, it's a large rat. You drop the journal page, pounce on the rat, and grab it by its neck. You're very hungry, and very brave.

I break it's fat rat neck

How do you kill it?

I bite it's head off and eat it raw. My baby needs protein and vitamins to survive.

You lay it's bloody carcass down on the table and turn to the kitchen cupboard instinctively looking for a carving knife. You left here when you were 11, how do you know where the carving knife is? Before you open the cupboard, the wounded rat jumps off the table, scurries across the room, and under the floorboards. You turn to run after it, but your pregnant belly makes it awkward to get onto the ground and slip your hand beneath the floorboards. You compose yourself and remember why you are here.

You pick the journal page back up, hold it up to the light and continue to read.

Memories of your childhood come flooding back to you. Overwhelmed, and feeling the weight of your pregnancy, you collapse onto the tiny wood frame BED. It supports you/it collapses under you. The bed linens smell fresh like flowers/disgustingly rotten. You throw the linens aside and find another page of the journal. Do you pick it up, and hold it up to the light to read the real story? Or do you look down on the journal page and read it without picking it up?

I want you to know this story for two reasons: It shows you, a young girl being the hero in your own life story, and it shows you that children can overcome negligent parents and a brutal world. I've wrapped the story in sweets to sugar coat the bitter pill of real life. Please tell me that you're going to be brave again and read the whole story that I have left for you?




In the morning your step mother sends you and Hansel off with your father. Vision of your mother: showing you the secret "women's business" recipe book that has been handed down through the women in your family. The diagrams are gruesome anatomy studies. The pages are soaked in blood. Hansel leaves a trail of white pebbles behind you. As you wander through the woods, Vision of your mother: remember your mother showing you where to stab her to kill her. "Stab me here, and slice quickly across here." Your mother is prepared for sacrifice. Do you think that you are the reason that your mother is dead? (Insert Element in the environment that allows Player to make a choice then return to story) Your father leaves you in the woods to "gather twigs." But your father never comes back. As you and Hansel lie in the forest waiting for your father, and then waiting for the moon to rise, you imagine stabbing your step-mother to kill her. When the full moon rises, the white pebbles are illuminated and you and Hansel follow them back home. Your step-mother is furious to see you arrive back home in time for dinner. You beg to be let into your own home. Your step-mother must share her meager dinner of stone soup among four of you instead of just with her husband.

You stand up, walk over to the little TABLE in the middle of the modest room, and sit down on a simple wooden stool. You remember what it was like to be a little girl in this tiny house with your step-mother, father, and brother. The smell of home cooking/rotten meat wafts over you.

Can you imagine how your step-mother would have screamed at your father? "You can't even lose two little children in the woods--you're good for nothing!" In a famine, it's all about the food! Life or death. Your step-mother wanted to survive, even at the expense of your death.



When you go to bed that night, Hansel is tired and falls right to sleep. You stay awake and pray to your dead mother for advice. She comes to you in a vision and tells you must survive and shows you again on herself, how to stab a human body to kill it. Only this time she is really cut open. As her mortal wound purges blood, she looks at you lovingly. Your vision is interrupted when... You overhear as your step-mother demands that your father he must get rid of you tomorrow. You fantasize about catching, killing, cutting up, cooking, and curing your step-mother just like your mother taught you. You imagine feeding her to your father and brother. Could you do it if you needed to survive? (Insert Element in the environment that allows Player to make a choice then return to story) Did you do it?(Insert Element in the environment that allows Player to make a choice then return to story) Hansel is asleep and doesn't hear your step-mother and father talking. Witch says something snarky



Witch says something snarky






Suddenly filled with terror at these memories, you run out of the house and run all of the way to the witch's house. There, she is waiting for you.

Your fury at what she has done to your family makes you kill her.





She tells you that if you don't kill Hansel, you will have wasted your beloved mother's sacrifice for you. You screw up your courage and kill, cut up, cook and cure Hansel. The Witch tells you that your mother would be proud of you. You break down in tears. The Witch helps you concoct a story to make yourself feel better, that the fairytale version that's been baring on your head. Just like this... You push the witch into the stove and cook her alive.

Finally, the witch loses her patience.... She decides... eat Hansel regardless of how fat he is. ... She asks you to light the stove. You tell the witch that you can't get the stove to lit, can she look at it? When she does... ... You push the witch into the stove and cook her alive.
